#### **Abstract of PhD Dissertation**

The work undertaken in doctoral dissertation involves an exploration of Kant's conception of judgment and normativity. The basic thesis is twofold: (a) normative commitment is always embodied and singular and not a theoretical conviction – although distinctly not empirical, which reflects (b) that the principle of judgment-power (reflective judgment) is neither foundational nor anti-foundational, but orientational. This latter aspect points towards the feeling of orientation, which does not only refer to a pre-established horizon of meaning, but creates also this horizon. Orientation, being at the heart of our self-reflection, is embodied and singular, but involves a 'facticity', which nonetheless, in no way resembles an 'empirical fact' or a 'normative (moral) fact'.

It rather refers to a *mode* of being, that is, the problematization of the relation of our cognition to an object of cognition, which adds necessity and grounds 'normativity'. A mode provides the transition from the possible to the actual, by acknowledging the distinct Kantian thesis that the fundamental dichotomy between a concept and an intuition is not logical, but metaphysical. Modality passes through 'schemata' and 'symbols' as intermediaries in the way it *imaginatively* constitutes the connection between concept and intuition.

Normative commitment, accordingly, is not conceptual all the way down, but it retains a symbolic value, something that opens it to communication. Therefore, instead of remaining introspective, as a *mode* of self-reflection, it is now revealed as being part of the normative (although not moral) idea of *sensus communis*, which negotiates our *orientation*. It is here that Kant locates a distinct (thin) normativity of our participation in a community, acknowledging not only the social origin (restriction) of our *orientation*, but the ability to transcend it (realization and change).
